We are deeply saddened by the news of a school shooting in Texas yesterday. There are no words to adequately express the deep sorrow we feel for the victims. Although we may be many miles away from Uvalde, Texas, we all feel the impact of violence that touches a school. We offer our deepest condolences to the families, students, staff, and community that are grieving such a profound loss.

Student and staff safety is our utmost priority. We have systems and plans in place to keep everyone as safe as possible and are further refining our current safety plans.

Current safety measures:

- 1. Secure all entrances at all buildings
- 2. Continue to monitor and update the school safety plans
- 3. Collaborative partnerships with San Juan County Sheriff's department
- 4. Mental Health and counseling support

This is difficult to process; as parents we are struggling with you. Acts of violence such as these are especially disturbing and frightening. In response there are many things we as adults can do to reassure our students of their safety at school.

As our children learn of this event, it is important to know it may cause them to question their own safety. We can reassure them that the adults around them will do everything in their power to keep them safe.
