Graduation Pathway Options:

State Assessment | Dual Credit | AP/IB/Cambridge | SAT/ACT | Transition Course | Combination | ASVAB | CTE Sequence

Beginning with the Class of 2020, students must meet at least one of these pathway options to graduate:

- State Assessment: Meet or exceed the graduation scores in the Smarter Balanced Assessments (SBA) in English language arts (ELA)
 and mathematics or in WA-AIM (Washington Access to Instruction & Measurement).
- Dual Credit: Earn at least one high school credit in ELA and at least one high school credit in math in dual credit courses (Running Start, College in the High School, and/or Career and Technical Education dual credit courses).
- AP/IB/Cambridge: For both ELA and math, earn a 3 or higher on certain Advanced Placement (AP) exams or a 4 or higher on certain International Baccalaureate (IB) exams or an E on certain Cambridge International exams, or pass the course with at least a C+.
- . SAT/ACT: Meet or exceed the graduation scores set by SBE in the math and ELA portions of the SAT or ACT.
- Transition Course: Pass a transition course in ELA and math (for example, a Bridge to College course) which allows a student to place directly into a credit-bearing college level course.
- . Combination: Meet any combination of at least one ELA and one math option of those options listed in 1-5.
- ASVAB: Meet standard on the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) by scoring at least the minimum established by the
 military for eligibility to serve in a branch of the armed services.*
- CTE Sequence: Complete a sequence of Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses.*


*Note: Students who pursue these pathways (ASVAB or CTE) do not need to meet English and math requirements separately. English and math content are embedded in both pathways—and a student who meets either the ASVAB standard or the CTE pathway requirements has met the graduation pathway requirement.




Earnings and unemployment rates by educational attainment, 2023







Common App, Community/Tech College App, or Institution-Specific











Common App

- Platform for 4 year college applications
- Some schools use this, some don't
- Makes it easier for you to apply to multiple schools



Community/Tech College App




• 20-30 minutes to complete





Institution-Specific Apps

- Apply directly on a school's website
- May take less time that the Common App if you are only applying to one school
- Some schools are not on the Common App, this would be your only option

- Schools that participate
 - Central Washington University
 - Eastern Washington University
 - The Evergreen State College
 - Washington State University
 - Western Washington University
 - O University of Washington, Tacoma
- 3.0 GPA
- CADR courses must be met
- You still fill out the regular application

























- Schools that participate
 - Pacific Lutheran University
- 3.3 GPA
- Integrated 3 (Algebra 2)
- CADR courses must be met
- You **DO NOT** fill out the regular application
- Consent form from the CCC in September





CADR Requirements

College Academic Distribution Requirements

- 4 Year colleges require you to have completed certain classes in high school
 - 4 credits English
 - 3 credits Math (up through Algebra 2)
 - o 3 credits Science
 - 3 credits Social Studies
 - 1 credit Art
 - 2 credits World Language
- Math required senior year if you have not already taken pre-calc or higher



Types of Financial Aid

Gift Aid

- Scholarships (local, college, other)
- Scholarship Search
 Options
- Grants
- Do not have to be paid back

Work-Study

Earn while you learn



Loans

- Have to be paid back (with interest)
- Offered with financial aid package, through your college's Financial Aid Office
- Private or Federal

Local Scholarships

- Spring of senior year
- FHHS Common Scholarship App
- Due in April
- Announced at graduation
- Best chances of getting a scholarship!!

San Juan Island Service Scholarship

- 80 hours of community service = \$1000
 - o 3 hours have to be for SJISS
- Must volunteer for at least 3 non-profits/community organizations on SJI
- Register on their website
- Mobileserve App for signing up for opportunities & tracking hours

School-Specific Scholarships

- <u>WWU</u> example -> Financial Aid Office
- Sometimes your admission application automatically applies you for scholarships, but not always
- Call or email the financial aid office
- Deadlines are different than admission deadlines

State Scholarships

- Scholarship Search Options on CCC Website
- I recommend <u>WashBoard.org</u>
- College Bound Scholarship = FULL TUITION for public schools in WA!!!



Only WA State residents apply = better chances for you!



College Bound Scholarship

- Based on income eligibility
- Had to have signed up in middle school
- Full tuition for public schools in WA for 4 years

National / International Scholarships

- Scholarship Search Options on CCC Website
- Hardest to get (more people apply)



- This is how you get loans / federal and state grants
- Usually opens October 1 every year, December 1 in recent years
- Do it every year that you need financial aid
- Some scholarships require you to have done your FAFSA
- Possible grants/work study/scholarships (first come first served)
- Student Loan Education Site

FAFSA Cont.

- Based on prior-prior year's taxes
- Uses IRS Data
- FAFSA determines Student Aid Index (SAI)
- Lower income = better chance of gift aid
- Most everyone qualifies for loans
 - Subsidized: US Dept. of Ed. pays interest while in school
 - Unsubsidized: You pay interest while in school
- Every college has their own deadline for FAFSA completion




CSS Profile (College Scholarship Service)

- Through College Board
- Non-federal aid
- Considers income and expenses
- Required at many private colleges and some public
- Completed in the fall
- Every college has their own deadline for completion

You will get this after you have been admitted. It will show what loans, scholarships, etc. you are offered.






