 - Location (close to home or far away)
 - Setting (rural, suburban, urban)

 - Co-curricular activities
 - GPA / Test Scores (SAT/ACT)

Campus Visits


- Sign up for scheduled tours
- Attend information sessions
- Have prepared questions
- Meet w/ an admissions counselor
- Visit with department head
- Sit on in a class
- Visit with a coach

- What do you like/dislike about the campus?
- What are the students like?
- Ask students questions
- Do you see yourself fitting in?
- Keep notes/brochure
- Have lunch on campus








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Deadlines: Early Action vs. Early Decision vs. Regular Decision

- Regular Decision (RD)
 - Most common form of applying
 - Can apply to multiple schools
- Early Action (EA)
 - Non-Binding
 - OK to apply to many EA schools
 - Strong competition to select schools
- Early Decision (ED)
 - Binding (you have to go if accepted)
 - Can only apply to one school ED
 - Possibility of poor financial aid
 - Might get a closer look
 - Contract must be signed by parent and guidance counselor
 - Discussion with university advised





What Colleges Look At

- Academic Profile
 - Transcripts
 - SAT/ACT
 - Class rank
 - Courses / rigor
 - Grades (GPA)

- Personal Profile
 - Essay
 - Resume
 - Extracurricular activities
 - Honors and awards
 - Travel
 - Work experience
 - Community service
 - Hobbies
 - Site visit
 - Interview



Essay

DO

- Focus on a moment in time, not your whole life story
- Ask friends/family what makes you stand out
- Be concise keep it moving
- Write a compelling intro
- Ask someone to read it for you
 & give feedback

AVOID

- Listing achievements and involvement (this is on your resume or other areas of the application)
- Listing character traits
- Waiting until the last minute to write it
- Submitting without proofreading / editing



Personal Essay Prompts

- Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please **share your story.**
- 2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- 3. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. **What prompted your thinking?** What was the outcome?
- 4. Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. **How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?**
- 5. Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a **period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself** or others.
- 6. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? **What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?**
- 7. Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.



- Opens in October (hopefully)
 - First come, first served
- Student and Parent have separate accounts
- Links to IRS data
 - Based on prior year's tax info
- Determines your Student Aid Index (SAI)
 - Lower SAI more likely to receive gift aid
 - Money in student's name
- Anyone can qualify for certain types of aid





Types of Aid

- Gift Aid (federal, state, school)
 - Doesn't have to be paid back
- Work Study (federal)
 - Earn while you learn
- Loans (federal, private)
 - Must be repaid, including interest
 - OK to accept with financial aid package
 - Track loan amount
 - Know payback terms

Deadlines to complete financial aid applications are different than admission application deadlines!



A Few Last Things

- Call the colleges with questions or to make sure admissions and financial aid applications are complete
- Scholarship displacement- ask financial aid office about the impact on your aid if you are awarded local scholarships (what will be taken away?)
- Start now and do a little at a time

FAFSA/CSSP December of senior year and community scholarships in the spring Make a Decision!

Commit by May 1. Secure financial aid/plans.
